We have more than 450 registered players across 25 teams at HYFC. That is only possible through the

commitment of over 70 volunteer coaches, team admins and committee members.

Thank you to parents and carers who trust their children with us and to our sponsors and club partners who are investing in the development of youth football in Haddenham.

HYFC is committed to the FA's new Grassroots Code and playing the beautiful game in the right way, respecting players, coaches and referees.

We have set out ambitious plans to improve facilities, enhance coaching and create more special experiences. These can only be achieved by securing additional funds and, we hope, active support from more parent/carer volunteers would be hugely appreciated.
